Medical Office/Office Administration Program

In the Medical Office Administration program, students can receive a two-year degree, a one-year diploma, a Medical Administrative Specialist certificate, or a Medical Office certificate. The program prepares individuals for employment in medical and other healthcare-related offices. Course work includes medical terminology; medical coding, billing and insurance; medical legal issues; formatting; and word processing. Students learn administrative and support functions and develop skills needed in the medical environment. Employment opportunities are available in medical and dental offices, hospitals, insurance companies, laboratories, medical supply companies, and other healthcare-related organizations. Please see Sherry Hines in North 201F to enroll in this program.

In the Office Administration program, students can receive a two-year degree, a one-year diploma, an Office Administration certificate, or an Office Administration/Medical certificate. The Office Administration curriculum prepares individuals for positions in administrative support careers. Graduates qualify for employment in a variety of positions in business, government, and industry. Job classifications range from entry-level to supervisor to middle management.

Disability Services:



Each *semester*, it is the responsibility of the students to make contact with the Disability Services Coordinator and request their need for services and classroom accommodations. The concept behind transitioning into higher education is to prepare students for self-determination. Self-determination means that the student's plans and goals for the future should be the basis for decision-making.

Remember, it is your responsibility to request services and classroom accommodations. The process is as follows:

1. Complete the admissions process;

3. Provide professional documentation of your stated disability or sign a consent form to verify your stated disability;
4. Discuss your arrangement of services with the Disability Services Coordinator;

Make periodic contact with your Disability Services Coordinator throughout the semester.
